NEWARK 4 ONEONTA 3

ONEONTA, N.Y. - The visiting Pilots extended their winning streak to four with a one-run decision at Damaschke Field. The loss ended a four-game winning streak for the Outlaws. Tariq Staton (Southern Utah) broke a scoreless tie in the fourth with a sacrifice fly. Later in the frame, back-to-back RBI singles by Ben Bostick (St. John Fisher) and Cash Barker (TAMUK) pushed the Newark edge to three. Oneonta responded with two runs in fifth on a Clay Holcomb (Troy) two-RBI single. Newark's Josh Perez (Miss. College) scored the eventual game-winning run in the sixth on a throwing error. Oneonta threatened in the sixth with a sacrifice fly from Lucas Leifield (Grand Canyon) but that was the only run Newark reliever Chris Rogers (Okla. Baptist) would allow in three frames. Pilot pitchers picked off two Outlaw runners and two others were thrown out attempting to steal. Austin McAuliffe (NJIT) pitched five innings and did not allow an earned run in his first win. Ben Bostick and Joe Landi (URI) each had two hits for Newark. Zac Johnson (Illinois State) led the Outlaws with three singles in three at-bats.

WATERTOWN 12 ELMIRA 2

ELMIRA, N.Y. - Donald Walter (CPP) slugged two home runs and the Wizards scored a total of 12 runs in their first four at-bats to rout the Pioneers in front of 3,843 at Dunn Field. Walter led off the game with a solo belt and then smashed a second solo home run as part of a seven-run third. The Purple and Gold plated one run in the first, two in the second, seven in the third and two in the fourth on 14 total hits. Eight Wizards had at least one hit. Donald Walter had three RBI, Cole Gleason (Wabash Valley) was 3-for-4 with three scores and one RBI and Chris Glynn (UW Parkside) knocked in three runs. Wizards' starter Rene Solis (St. Mary's, Texas) held Elmira to one run on eight hits over six innings and struck out six. Elmira managed 10 hits off of Watertown pitching. Aaron Nardone (Delaware State) smacked a solo home run and finished with two hits as did Steven Patterson (San Joaquin Delta).

AMSTERDAM 9 ALBANY 3

ALBANY, N.Y. - The Mohawks scored eight unanswered runs to sprint past the Dutchmen at Bob Bellizzi Field. Amsterdam trailed 3-1 entering the seventh. Chase Green (SIUE) doubled home Jeff Boehm (Kentucky) to cut the Albany lead to one. The Mohawks then erupted for five runs in the eighth on three hits and two Albany errors due to heavy gusting winds. Josh Nethaway (UAlbany) had the big hit of the rally with a two-run single. Jeff Boehm added another two-run single in the ninth. Mohawks reliever Matt Gage (Siena) yielded just one hit and struck out seven over four scoreless innings to earn his fourth win. Gage and three other Mohawks pitchers combined on a four-hitter. Albany starter Cody Tollison (MTSU) took a tough no decision. He held Amsterdam to two runs on four hits through 6.1 frames and struck out a season-high 10. For the Dutch, Zach Remillard (Coastal Carolina-2012-13) drilled a two-run double and Morgan Phillips (Charleston) was 2-for-4 with one RBI.

GLENS FALLS 14 COOPERSTOWN 4 (GAME 1)

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. - Brandon Magallones (Northwestern) tossed a three-hitter through six and the Golden Eagles struck for a season high 14 runs to defeat the Hawkeyes in the opening game of a doubleheader at East Field. Magallones allowed just one run on three singles, walked two and struck out nine to pocket his second-straight win. Glens Falls posted single scores in the first, second and fourth innings though the decisive frames were a six-run third and a five-run fifth. Chris King (Louisburg) and Emmanuel Forcier (New Mexico JC) each highlighted the fifth with two-RBI hits and Mike Vigliarolo (Saint Louis) crushed a three-run home run in the sixth. Seven Golden Eagles had one hit, eight of nine starters scored at least one run and five of those eight tallied multiple times. Chris King went 2-for-3 with three runs scored and Emmanuel Forcier had two hits, two runs and two RBI. Bradley Vanderglas (NKU) had one RBI for the visitors.

GLENS FALLS 13 COOPERSTOWN 4 (GAME 2)

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. - Three pitchers combined on a two-hitter and the Golden Eagles scored 12 runs over the first three innings en route to completing a doubleheader sweep of the Hawkeyes at East Field. Glens Falls finished the twin bill with 27 runs. Neil Fryer (Siena) gave up two runs on two hits through the first three innings, Jake Doller (Kansas State) retired all six men he faced and Mike Clarkson (South Florida) did not allow a Cooperstown hit in the final two innings. The Green and Gold scored three runs in the first, four in the second, five in the third and one in the fourth. Six Golden Eagles scored multiple runs led by Chase Griffin (Ga. Southern) who went 2-for-3 with two RBI and three runs recorded. Danny Brennan (Saint Louis) cracked a game high three hits and scored twice and Casey Rodrigue (LSU Eunice) had two hits and two runs. Cooperstown's Matt Carr (New Paltz) and Ty Morris (CSU Monterey Bay) teamed up to drive in two runs apiece; three of the four runs were on sacrifice flies of which Carr had two. Matt Urakami (CSU Monterey Bay) scored twice.

TODAY IN PGCBL HISTORY

June 28, 2011

*Amsterdam defeated Newark 8-0 in a rain-shortened game that lasted five innings at Shuttleworth Park. Amsterdam's Kris Barone pitched a two-hit shutout and struck out four. He seated the first 10 batters he faced while the Amsterdam offense accounted for eight first-inning runs.

*Watertown's Rob Curran threw a nine-inning complete game in an 11-4 win over Albany at Bob Bellizzi Field. Curran scattered 10 hits and struck out seven in his second complete game of the summer. Larry Balkwill and 2011 PGCBL Player of the Year Erick Gaylord each hit home runs for Watertown; Balkwill finished with three hits, three RBI and two runs scored.

*Glens Falls nipped Elmira at Dunn Field with a 5-4 decision in the Twin Tiers. The visiting Golden Eagles jumped out to a 4-0 lead and held on for the win. Elmira was never closer than one. 2011 All-PGCBL selection Josh Anderson hit a three-run home run for Glens Falls and All-PGCBL utility man Kyle Ruchim earned the save and stranded the potential tying run on base in the ninth.

*On this day last year, Newark's Matt Frahm and Neil Fryer of Glens Falls were tied for the league lead with three victories apiece.

*Glens Falls starting pitcher Derek Mazzio led all hurlers with 26 strikeouts and Elmira's Jordan Carter was tops in the circuit with a 0.00 ERA.

*In the PGCBL East, Glens Falls (11-3) had a four-game lead over second-place Mohawk Valley. Eventual division and league runner-up Amsterdam was 6-8. Meanwhile in the PGCBL West, Elmira (8-7) and Cooperstown (6-5) were tied for the top spot with Cooperstown holding a slim margin based on winning percentage.

*In the PG Crosschecker Summer Top 30, the Glens Falls Golden Eagles were ranked 12th. Glens Falls was the only team from the league in the rankings.

Playoffs: August 3 - August 9 Playoff Teams: Four, the top four teams in the standings at the end of the regular season qualify for the playoffs. Format: Two rounds, each contested in a best-of-three series. The playoff semifinals will run from August 3 through August 5 and those will be followed by the PGCBL Championship Series which will take place from August 7 through August 9. In the divisional playoffs, the higher seed will host the first and third game (if necessary) of the series and the lower seed will host the second game. The same format will be used in the finals with the higher-seeded team hosting the first and third game (if necessary and the lower-seeded team hosting the second game.
